Who is this for?

- **Schools & groups**: Service-learning coordinators, CAS directors, and youth programme leaders who want to add a credit-bearing qualification to existing projects.
- **Community organisations**: NGOs and youth groups seeking a formal way to recognise and reward their volunteers.



1) Understanding Host Community & Volunteer Roles

(5 credits | ~42 GLH)

Understand the community you'll work with and the responsibilities you carry as a volunteer. This module focuses on cultural awareness, safeguarding, and the ability to plan and deliver community-based activities.

You will learn to:

- Analyse community characteristics and perspectives.
- Understand safeguarding duties and disclosures.
- Manage placement challenges.
- Plan, deliver, and evaluate an activity.

Scope: UNCRC, recognising abuse, duty of care, cultural adaptation.

Module Overviews

2) Planning and Preparing for Service

(7 credits | 32 GLH)

Prepare for success in your volunteering journey. This module helps learners reflect on their motivations, assess their skills, research opportunities, and build a tailored placement plan. A key component is preparing and delivering a presentation, simulating a real selection process.

You will learn to:

- Identify personal strengths and motivations.
- Research opportunities and assess logistics.
- Produce and justify a placement plan.
- Deliver a short presentation.

Skills: Communication, confidence, leadership, planning, resilience.

3) Global Citizenry

(9 credits | ~30 GLH)

Link your local service to global challenges. This module introduces the concept of global citizenship, the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), and the interconnected issues of poverty, inequality, climate change, and human rights.

You will learn to:

- Define global citizenship and its responsibilities.
- Analyse causes of global issues and local impact.
- Understand the 17 SDGs and their progress.
- Build intercultural skills in empathy and communication.

Values: Empathy, respect, responsibility, action.

4) Professionalism in Practice in Community Service

(14 credits | ~53 GLH)

Put your skills into action during your placement. This module guides you to set goals, lead activities, and conduct a community research project — demonstrating professionalism and responsibility in practice.

You will learn to:

- Adapt to new cultural and social contexts.
- Create and review an activity plan.
- Deliver volunteer-led initiatives, including one linked to a local event.
- Evaluate outcomes and write a researchinformed report.

Skills: Project management, leadership, accountability, reflective evaluation.

5) Looking Back, Moving Forward — Reflecting on Your Service

(3 credits | ~16 GLH)

Consolidate your learning through reflection. This final module helps you evaluate your achievements and challenges, assess your impact, and connect your experience to broader local and global issues.

You will learn to:

- Identify and reflect on three key achievements and three challenges.
- Evaluate the skills you gained and how they transfer to your future.
- Analyse a local or global issue encountered during your placement and propose responses as a global citizen.
- Assess the impact of your volunteering on yourself and your community.

Outcome: A reflective portfolio demonstrating growth, impact, and global awareness.

Understand the community context, safeguard responsibly, and deliver activities that matter.

Lead volunteer initiatives, apply professionalism, and complete a community research project.


Step 5 - Reflect
